The gift was, as Graham describes it, 'a personal gesture from the hotel group, demonstrating our gratitude to Madiba for what he has done for us as individuals, as an organisation and as a country.'

Graham has met Madiba on two previous occasions, but this was the first time in an informal environment. 'Despite Mr Mandela's frailty, his mind is as alert as ever. The more we spoke, the more I realised how much I look up to what he stands for as a leader. Every day I try to refer to the values he portrays and work to bring them into our business and how I live my own life ... values such as being humble, having integrity, listening to others and having respect for who people are, not for their title or so-called standing in society.'

Earlier this year, on Madiba's birthday (the 18th of July, now recognised internationally as Nelson Mandela Day), millions of people around the world devoted 67, minutes of their time to helping others one for every year that Mandela has been an agent of acts of kindness. Graham says that Southern Sun staff were encouraged to make a positive difference in someone else's life that day, be it within their family or community, or just somebody in need. 'This is such a simple gesture of goodwill, but one that I hope will help us to continue the legacy of Mr Mandela's selfless actions.'

If you're wondering why they're wearing Bafana Bafana soccer kit in the photograph above, it's not only because of Madiba's well-known love of the game, but because it just happened to be Football Friday, a Southern Sun initiative that encourages staff and guests to wear their favourite soccer team's shirt to promote the 2010 World Cup.
